

### About the Wake Tech Fact Book

Wake Tech's Fact Book is designed to provide an easily readable compilation of data about the College to the public, faculty, staff and administrators, planners and other selected individuals: such as trustees, local commissioners, and legislators. While some historical information is included, the data and facts offered provide a profile of the College for one academic year. In addition, the historical data presented helps to illustrate the rate of growth and change Wake Tech has experienced.

The College's Office of Institutional Effectiveness, Accreditation and Research (IEAR) compiles this information under the direction of Dr. John B. Boone, Dean of IEAR. The research and reports are prepared by the Research Specialist, with the Technical Assistant assembling the information into a single publication.

The 2018 edition of the Fact Book includes the annual IPEDS (Integrated Postsecondary Data System) report which contains comparative information about Wake Tech and its peer two-year institutions in the United States. New tables and graphs have also been added to many of the sections of the Fact Book. The 2017-2018 Trends document highlights changes WTCC has witnessed over time in comparison to other North Carolina Community College System (NCCCS) institutions, as well as emerging trends in relation to WTCC's Curriculum Education, Workforce Continuing Education, Enrollment and Student Services, Human Resources, Funding and Facilities. As with certain external publications, such as the NCCCS Performance Measures for Student Success Report, and the IPEDS Data Feedback Report, the WTCC Fact Book provides data and analysis from the prior academic year. This year's report, however, will include selected data points from the 2018-2019 academic year in the attempt to provide as up-to-date information as possible.

#### Selected Data Points from 2017-2018

## Fun FACT

Wake Tech serves over 70K students annually making Wake Tech the largest community college in the state of North Carolina.

- 2017-2018 marked the 5<sup>th</sup> consecutive year in which WTCC had the largest Annual Budget Curriculum Full-Time Equivalent within the NCCCS.
- WTCC has experienced a significant amount of funding growth as a result of its Office of Sponsored Programs. There has been a 926% increase in the amount of grant dollars WTCC has received over the past 14 years, with the College growing from \$781,561 in awards to \$8,020,637 during that time frame.
- WTCC has witnessed a 26.6% increase in Special Credit Students from 2014-2015 (2,037) to 2017-2018 (2,580).
- There has been a 164% increase in completions/awards (including GED and AHS diplomas) granted over the past 8 years (from 3,350 completions in 2010-2011 to 8,860 completions in 2017-2018). Since the college opened in 1963, Wake Tech has awarded more than 102,000 academic credentials (including GED and AHS diplomas).

WTCC has witnessed a **108% increase in Annual Curriculum Education Unduplicated Headcount** from 2000-01 (14,214) compared with 2017-2018 (29,574)



A twelve-year lookback of total WTCC **Financial Aid awards** granted revealed an increase of \$62,378,417 in financial aid provided to WTCC students from \$10,681,124 in 2005-2006 to \$73,059,541 in 2017-2018.

This figure represents a **584% increase**.

- The amount of WTCC students served through Disability Support Services has increased significantly over the past several years, with a 52.8% increase taking place from Fall 2012 (744) to Fall 2018 (1,137). The same pattern emerges when comparing Spring terms, with a 29.9% increase taking place from Spring 2013 (887) to Spring 2018 (1,153).
- Educational attainment rates have increased among WTCC Faculty & Staff from 2013 to 2018. There has been a 5.4% increase in employees with advanced degrees (MA, MS, MEd, Ed.S., Ph.D., Ed.D.) since 2013. In the 2013-2014 academic year, 56.6% of faculty held an advanced degree; this figure rose to 61.2% in 2017-2018. Likewise, in 2013-2014, 28.8% of staff held an advanced degree; this figure rose to 33.5% in 2017-2018.

- WTCC has witnessed rather significant increases in total budget funding over the past nine consecutive years (2009-10 2017-18).
  - o **18.9%** increase in **County** allocation
  - o **59.3%** increase in **County construction**
  - o **38.3%** increase in **State** allocation
  - o 64.4% increase in Tuition funding
  - o 97.1% increase in Federal funding
  - o 49.0% increase in Pell funding
  - 65.8% increase in funding from Other sources (any revenue WTCC has earned; concessions, bookstore, external events, etc.)

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

#### Wake Tech: Leading the Way for 50 Years

In the late 1950s, the North Carolina General Assembly approved funding for a new concept in higher education: industrial education centers that would train adults in the vocational and technical skills needed by the region's emerging industries.

The Wake County Industrial Education Center was chartered in 1958, and officials began searching for a permanent site for the institution. While they looked, they started offering a few classes – in blueprint reading, power sewing, and technical secretary – at community sites. They also launched a licensed practical nursing program at Memorial Hospital (now WakeMed) in Raleigh.

It wasn't long before officials found land south of Raleigh as a home for this new institution, with a new name that honored W.W. "Bill" Holding, a county commissioner and original steering committee member. The W.W. Holding Industrial Education Center opened on October 7, 1963, with 34 full-time students in Automobile Mechanics, Radio and TV Repair, Electrical Installation and Maintenance, and Drafting. An additional 270 students took classes at community sites and were enrolled in the nursing program.

Today, Wake Tech has expanded to six campuses. The college also operates two Career Technical Education (CTE) High Schools and one Early College High School, along with dozens of community sites throughout Wake County. Enrollment has grown to more than 70,000 students a year.

Fifty-five years after opening its doors, Wake Tech is still leading the way, preparing students for successful careers, training a highly-skilled workforce, and serving as a major force in the economic development of the region.










Figure 1. Percent of all students enrolled, by race/ethnicity, and percent of students who are women: Fall 2017






Figure 4. Academic year tuition and required fees for full-time, first-time degree/certificate-seeking undergraduates: 2014-15 to 2017-18


Figure 6. Percent of full-time, first-time degree/certificate-seeking undergraduate students who were awarded grant or scholarship aid from the federal government, state/local government, or the institution, or loans, by type of aid: 2016-17


Figure 5. Average net price of attendance for full-time, first-time degree/certificate-seeking undergraduate students, who were awarded grant or scholarship aid: 2014-15 to 2016-


Figure 7. Average amounts of awarded grant or scholarship aid from the federal government, state/local government, or the institution, or loans awarded to full-time, first-time degree/certificate-seeking undergraduate students, by type of aid: 2016-17




Figure 8. Percent of all undergraduates awarded aid, by type of aid: 2016-17




Figure 10. Retention rates of full-time, first-time degree/certificate seeking students: Fall 2016 cohort


Figure 11. Graduation and transfer-out rates of full-time, first-time degree/certificate-seeking undergraduates within 150% of normal time to program completion: 2014 cohort


Figure 12. Graduation rates of full-time, first-time degree/certificate-seeking undergraduates within 150% of normal time to program completion, by race/ethnicity: 2014 cohort














Figure 19. Percent distribution of core revenues, by source: Fiscal year 2017

Figure 20. Core expenses per FTE enrollment, by function: Fiscal year 2017






Figure 21. Full-time equivalent staff, by occupational category: Fall 2017

Figure 22. Average salaries of full-time instructional non-medical staff equated to 9-months worked, by academic rank:


Academic year 2017-18


Figure 23. Percent distribution of library collection, by material type: Fiscal Year 2017

This report is based on data supplied by institutions to IPEDS during 2017-18 data collection year. Response rates exceeded 99% for most surveys. # **Use of Median Values for Comparison Group**

This report compares your institution's data to the median value for the comparison group for each statistic shown in the figure. If more than one statistic is present in a figure, the median values are determined separately for each indicator or statistic. ## Cohort Determination for Reporting Student Financial Aid, Graduation Rates, and Outcome Measures

Student cohorts for reporting Student Financial Aid and Graduation Rates data are based on the reporting type of the institution. For institutions that report based on an academic year (those operating on standard academic terms), student counts and cohorts are based on fall term data. Student counts and cohorts for program reporters (those that do not operate on standard academic terms) are based on unduplicated counts of students enrolled during a full 12-month period.

Student cohorts for reporting Outcome Measures are based on a full-year cohort from July 1-June 30 for all degree-granting institutions.

## DESCRIPTION OF STATISTICS USED IN THE FIGURES

#### Admissions (only for non-open-admissions schools)

#### Admissions and Test Score Data

Admissions and test score data are presented only for institutions that do not have an open admission policy, and apply to first-time, degree/certificate-seeking undergraduate students only. Applicants include only those students who fulfilled all requirements for consideration for admission and who were notified of one of the following actions: admission, non-admission, placement on a wait list, or application withdrawn (by applicant or institution). Admitted applicants (admissions) include wait-listed students who were subsequently offered admission. Early decision, early action, and students who began studies during the summer prior to the fall reporting period are included. For customized Data Feedback Reports, test scores are presented only if scores are required for admission.

#### **Student Enrollment**

#### FTE Enrollment

The full-time equivalent (FTE) enrollment used in this report is the sum of the institution's FTE undergraduate enrollment and FTE graduate enrollment (as calculated from or reported on the 12-month Enrollment component). Undergraduate and graduate FTE are estimated using 12-month instructional activity (credit and/or contact hours). See "Calculation of FTE Students (using instructional activity)" in the IPEDS Glossary at <a href="https://surveys.nces.ed.gov/ipeds/VisGlossaryAll.aspx">https://surveys.nces.ed.gov/ipeds/VisGlossaryAll.aspx</a>.

#### Total Entering Undergraduate Students

Total entering students are students at the undergraduate level, both full- and part-time, new to the institution in the fall term (or the prior summer term who returned in the fall). This includes all first-time undergraduate students, students transferring into the institution at the undergraduate level, and non-degree/certificate-seeking undergraduates entering in the fall. Only degree-granting, academic year reporting institutions provide total entering student data.

#### **Charges and Net Price**

#### Average Institutional Net Price

Average net price is calculated for full-time, first-time degree/certificate-seeking undergraduates who were awarded grant or scholarship aid from the federal government, state/local government, or the institution anytime during the full aid year. For public institutions, this includes only students who paid the in-state or in-district tuition rate. Other sources of grant aid are excluded. Average net price is generated by subtracting the average amount of federal, state/local government, and institutional grant and scholarship aid from the total cost of attendance. Total cost of attendance is the sum of published tuition and required fees, books and supplies, and the average room and board and other expenses.

For the purpose of the IPEDS reporting, aid awarded refers to financial aid that was awarded to, and accepted by, a student. This amount may differ from the aid amount that is disbursed to a student.

#### Retention, Graduation Rates, and Outcome Measures

# Retention Rates

Retention rates are measures at which students persist in their educational program at an institution, expressed as a percentage. For four-year institutions, this is the percentage of first-time bachelors (or equivalent) degree-seeking undergraduates from the previous fall who are again enrolled in the current fall. For all other institutions this is the percentage of first-time degree/certificate-seeking students from the previous fall who either re-enrolled or successfully completed their program by the current fall. The full-time retention rate is calculated using the percentage of full-time, first-time degree/certificate-seeking undergraduates, while the part-time rate is calculated using the percentage of part-time, first-time degree/certificate-seeking undergraduates.

#### Graduation Rates and Transfer-out Rate

Graduation rates are those developed to satisfy the requirements of the Student Right-to-Know Act and Higher Education Act, as amended, and are defined as the total number of individuals from a given cohort of full-time, first-time degree/certificate-seeking undergraduates who completed a degree or certificate within a given percent of normal time to complete all requirements of the degree or certificate program; divided by the total number of students in the cohort of full-time, first-time degree/certificate-seeking undergraduates minus any allowable exclusions. Institutions are permitted to exclude from the cohort students who died or were totally and permanently disabled; those who left school to serve in the armed forces or were called up to active duty; those who left to serve with a foreign aid service of the federal government, such as the Peace Corps; and those who left to serve on an official church mission.

A further extension of the traditional Graduation Rates (GR) component which carries forward 100% and 150% graduation rates data previously reported in the GR component is the Graduation Rates 200% (GR200) component, which request information on any additional completers and exclusions from the cohort between 151% and 200% normal time for students to complete all requirements of their program of study.

Transfer-out rate is the total number of students from the cohort who are known to have transferred out of the reporting institution (without earning a degree/award) and subsequently re-enrolled at another institution within the same time period; divided by the same adjusted cohort (initial cohort minus allowable exclusions) as described above. Only institutions with a mission that includes providing substantial preparation for students to enroll in another eligible institution are required to report transfers out.

#### Outcome Measures Data

Alternative measures of student success are reported by degree-granting institutions to describe the outcomes of four degree/certificate-seeking undergraduate student groups: Full-time, first-time (FTFT); Part-time, first-time (PTFT); Full-time, non-first-time (FTNFT), and Part-time, non-first-time (PTNFT). Additionally, each of the four cohorts collects data on two subcohorts: Pell grant recipients and non-Pell grant recipients. These measures provide the 4-year, 6-year, and 8-year award rates (or completions rates) after entering an institution. NCES calculates award rates by dividing a cohort's or subcohort's adjusted cohort into the number of total awards at 4-year, 6-year, and 8-year status points.

The initial cohort can be revised and take allowable exclusions resulting in an adjusted cohort. Institutions are permitted to exclude from the initial cohort the following: 1) students who died or were totally and permanently disabled; 2) those who left school to serve in the armed forces or were called up to active duty; 3) those who left to serve with a foreign aid service of the federal government, such as the Peace Corps; and 4) those who left to serve on an office church mission.

The highest award and the type of award (i.e., certificate, Associate's, or Bachelor's) are reported at each status point. For students who did not earn an undergraduate award after 8-years of entry, the enrollment statuses are reported as either still enrolled at the institution, or subsequently transferred out of the institution. Unlike the Graduation Rates data, all institutions must report on a full-year cohort (students entering July 1 of one year to June 30 to the next) and on their transfer out students, regardless if the institution has a mission that provides substantial transfer preparation.

#### **Finance**

#### Core Revenues

Core revenues for public institutions reporting under GASB standards include tuition and fees; government (federal, state, and local) appropriations and operating and nonoperating grants/contracts; private gifts, grants, and contracts (private operating grants/contracts plus gifts and contributions from affiliated entities); sales and services of educational activities; investment income; other operating and nonoperating sources; and other revenues and additions (capital appropriations and grants and additions to permanent endowments). "Other core revenues" include federal appropriations, sales and services of educational activities, other operating and nonoperating sources, and other revenues and additions.

Core revenues for private, not-for-profit institutions (and a small number of public institutions) reporting under FASB standards include tuition and fees; government (federal, state, and local) appropriations and grants/contracts; private gifts, grants/contracts (including contributions from affiliated entities); investment return; sales and services of educational activities; and other sources (a generated category of total revenues minus the sum of core and noncore categories on the Finance component). "Other core revenues" include government (federal, state, and local) appropriations, sales and services of educational activities, and other sources.

Core revenues for private, for-profit institutions reporting under FASB standards include tuition and fees; government (federal, state, and local) appropriations and grants/contracts; private grants/ contracts; investment income; sales and services of educational activities; and other sources (a generated category of total revenues minus the sum of core and noncore categories on the Finance component). "Other core revenues" include government (federal, state, and local) appropriations and other sources.

At degree-granting institutions, core revenues exclude revenues from auxiliary enterprises (e.g., bookstores and dormitories), hospitals, and independent operations. Non-degree-granting institutions do no report revenue from auxiliary enterprises in a separate category, and thus may include these amounts in the core revenues from other sources.

## Core Expenses

Core expenses include expenses for instruction, research, public service, academic support, institutional support, student services, grant aid/scholarships and fellowships (net of discounts and allowances), and other functional expenses (a generated category of total expense minus the sum of core and noncore functions on the Finance component). Expenses for operation and maintenance of plant, depreciation, and interest are allocated to each of the other functions. Core expenses at degree-granting institutions exclude expenses for auxiliary enterprises (e.g., bookstores and dormitories), hospitals, and independent operations. Non-degree-granting institutions do not report expenses for auxiliary enterprises in a separate category and thus may include these amounts in the core expenses as other expenses. "Other core expenses" is the sum of grant aid/scholarships and fellowships and other expenses.

#### **Endowment Assets**

Endowment assets, for public institutions under GASB standards, and private, not-for-profit institutions under FASB standards, include gross investments of endowment funds, term endowment funds, and funds functioning as endowment for the institution and any of its foundations and other affiliated organizations. Private, for-profit institutions under FASB do not hold or report endowment assets.

#### Salaries and Wages

Salaries and wages for public institutions under GASB standards and private (not-for-profit and for-profit) institutions under FASB standards, include amounts paid as compensation for services to all employees regardless of the duration of service, and amounts made to or on behalf of an individual over and above that received in the form of a salary or wage.

#### Staff

#### FTE Staff

The full-time-equivalent (FTE) by occupational category is calculated by summing the total number of full-time staff and adding one-third of the total number of part-time staff. Graduate assistants are not included.

## Equated Instructional Non-Medical Staff Salaries

Institutions reported the number of full-time nonmedical instructional staff and their salary outlays by academic rank, gender, and the number of months worked (9-, 10-, 11-, and 12-months). Salary outlays for staff who worked 10-, 11-, and 12-months were equated to 9-months of work by multiplying the outlays reported for 10-months by 0.90, the outlays reported for 11 months by 0.818, and the outlays reported for 12-months by 0.75. The equated 10-, 11-, and 12-outlays were then added to the outlays for instructional staff that worked 9-months to generate a total 9-month equated salary outlay. The total 9-month equated outlay was then divided by total number of instructional non-medical staff to determine an equated 9-month average salary. This calculation was done for each academic rank. Salary outlays were not reported for staff that work less than 9-months and were excluded.

# Student-to-Faculty Ratio

Institutions can provide their institution's student-to-faculty ratio (i.e., student-to-instructional staff) for undergraduate programs or follow the NCES guidance in calculating their student-to-faculty ratio, which is as follows: the number of FTE students (using Fall Enrollment survey data) divided by total FTE instructional staff (using the total Primarily instruction + Instruction/research/public service staff reported in Human Resources component and adding any not primarily instructional staff that are teaching a credit course). For this calculation, FTE for students is equal to the number of the full-time students plus one-third the number of part-time students; FTE for instructional staff is similarly calculated. Students in "stand-alone" graduate or professional programs (such as, medicine, law, veterinary, dentistry, social work, or public health) and instructional staff teaching in these programs are excluded from the FTE calculations.







# Wake Technical Community College Curriculum Education - Unduplicated Enrollment by Campus








# **Wake County Public School System**











### **Human Resources - Employees by Classification (F/T & P/T)**







## Wake Technical Community College Facilities Growth

#### 2019

• College opened Learning Way Road from Daffodil Drive to Lots S and R. The connecting intersection with US-401 and Learning Way Road is scheduled to open in January 2020.

#### 2018

- The Northern Wake Campus was renamed the Stephen C. Scott Northern Wake Campus.
- The first classroom building RTP1 (109,134 sq. ft.) opened at the new RTP Campus.
- Design began for the second building at RTP campus, a new Facilities /Warehouse Complex at the Southern Wake Campus and a new Automotive and Collision Repair Building at the Stephen C. Scott Northern Wake Campus.
- Received voter approval in November for a \$349 million construction bond referendum that passed with 65% of the vote. Funding will be used to pay for design and construction costs for projects in the 2016-23 Seven Year Capital Improvement Program.

#### 2017

- Building J (26,767 sq. ft.), Building K (90,779 sq. ft.) and Regional Energy Plant 3 (9,790 sq. ft.) opened at the Northern Wake Campus
- Received county commissioner's approval for the 2016-23 Seven Year Capital Improvement Program that will provide over \$510 million over the first seven years for design and construction projects and technology improvements.
- North Wake College and Career Academy opened Fall 2017, 931 Durham Road Wake Forest, NC 27587.

- Building H (64,368 sq. ft.) opened at the Northern Wake Campus and houses classrooms and laboratories for the health sciences programs including a STEM Lab, as well as space for the IT Services Department and Servers/Storage.
- Holding Hall on Southern Wake Campus (originally 43,348 sq. ft.) underwent a renovation and expansion, increasing it by 4,381 sq. ft. to a new total of 47,729 sq. ft. The building houses general education classrooms, Disability Support Services, the Mail Room, Facility Operations, Student Services, Campus Police, Career & Employment Resources, and Business Technologies.
- The Public Safety Education Center (formerly 100,666 sq. ft.) underwent a renovation and expansion, with renovations encompassing 34,858 sq. ft. of space with additions totaling 2,972 sq. ft. The new total for the Center is 103,638 sq. ft. This renovation added classroom, lab, and office space for Public Safety Education Programs including: barbering classroom & lab space, a computer lab, vocational labs, defensive tactics, armory, fire arms training simulator (FATS), and a 12 Lane Firing Range. The existing spaces for the Café and Incident Command Center in the Phase 2 area of the building were increased in size and renovated.
- Various areas of Buildings B & C (located on the Northern Wake Campus) were renovated to accommodate changes in programs and growth.
- The addition of Parking Lot P at Southern Wake Campus provided a net increase of 281 parking spaces. Parking Lot S was converted from a gravel parking lot to a paved parking lot with 706 parking spaces. Both projects included new parking lot lighting and blue light emergency phones. Security cameras were added to Parking Lot S as well.
- Purchased two additional tracts of land (2.05 acres) on Daffodil Drive / US-401 South adjacent to Southern Wake Campus. The Southern Wake Campus now comprises 144.76 acres on US-401S.

#### 2015

- Building F (87,310 sq. ft.) opened at the Northern Wake Campus and houses the Learning Commons area (new library location), Individualized Learning Center, Disability Support Services and general purpose classrooms and numerous faculty offices
- Parking Deck 2 opened at the Northern Wake Campus with 782 spaces
- Regional Energy Plant 2 (8,990 sq. ft.) opened at the Northern Wake Campus
- Purchased five tracts of land (4.79 acres) adjacent to the Southern Wake Campus and Daffodil Drive / US 401 South
- Opened new Beltline Education Center (81,000 sq. ft.) (3200 Bush Street) replacing the Adult Education Center on Capital Boulevard. This facility houses the college's Career Readiness programs, adult basic education programs (including High School Equivalency Preparation (GED preparation); Adult High School; English as a Second Language; and Adult Basic Education (ABE/TOPS).

#### 2014

- Montague Hall opened at Southern Wake Campus (48,721 sq. ft.). Named in honor of Harvey and Texana Montague.
- Vernon Malone College and Career Academy, 2200 South Wilmington Street in Raleigh, to open in the fall 2014
- Health Sciences Campus renamed Perry Health Sciences Campus to honor Jim Perry, Chair of Wake Tech's Board of Trustees, and his wife, Becky.
- Wake Tech broke ground on the first of four new instructional buildings at the Northern Wake Campus. The project will be constructed with funds from Wake County's 2012 bond referendum, which passed by an overwhelming 73%. The projects include Building F (87,310 sq. ft.), a parking deck (782 spaces), a regional energy plant, and two pedestrian bridges, which will be completed in 2015, and buildings L, M, and Skilled Trades in 2016.
- Wake Tech's Southern Wake Campus opened two new pedestrian walkways connecting Parking Lot S to Tech Road and the east side of campus.

#### 2013

- New parking lot (S) opened at Southern Wake Campus
- New parking deck (514 spaces), parking lot F (294 spaces), and G (459 spaces) opened at Northern Wake Campus
- Eastern Wake Education Center, in Zebulon, opened newest training facility a 300-square-foot house built to provide hands-on training for jobs in sustainable energy.

#### 2012

- Building E (80, 820 sq. ft.) on the Northern Wake Campus opened for students.
- Health Sciences 2 (105,283 sq. ft.) on the Health Science Campus opened for students.

- With the acquisition of additional rental space at the Western Wake Campus, five "smart" classrooms were added with spaces for a total of 130 students. In addition, an ILC extension room for math tutoring was added as well as space for one faculty member and one staff member.
- Parking Deck was completed on the Health Science Campus providing 500 spaces to students and faculty.
- College purchased seven additional acres adjacent to the RTP Campus. The RTP Campus has now 94 total acres.

#### 2010

- An additional 47,480 square foot section was added to the Public Safety Education Campus with the completion of the Phase II renovation. This was connected to the Phase I renovation (18,520 square feet) of the facility.
- The name of the Public Safety Training Center was officially changed to the Public Safety Education Campus, and the campus was approved by SACS.







## Accessible Area as a Percentage of Assignable (Table 24)

The Rehabilitation Act of 1973 focused national attention on the rights of handicapped persons. Section 504 of the Act stated that "no otherwise qualified handicapped individual in the United States . . . shall, solely by reason of his handicap, be excluded from the participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance." The more recent 1990 Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) reinforced this guideline while providing a very comprehensive set of regulations and definitions for addressing the special needs of people with a broad range of disabilities.


One of the groups protected by both pieces of legislation is the people who are confined to wheelchairs or whose mobility is otherwise impaired. Although neither of the Congressional Acts requires that colleges and universities make all of their facilities barrier-free, they do require that an institution's programs be made accessible to the handicapped. Although program accessibility can be partially achieved through changes other than facilities modifications, the amount of assignable space which is accessible to the mobility impaired is a factor which must be carefully considered in making programs accessible.

The National Center for Education Statistics conducted a survey in 1978 to determine the impact of the earlier Section 504 on colleges and universities. One of the findings of the survey was that **about 76% of the assignable area on college and university campuses would need to be made accessible** in order to comply with the program accessibility requirement of the original legislation.


